HONORS CAPSTONE PROJECT SPOTLIGHTS

The Class of 2021 recently completed their Honors Capstone Projects. A hybrid Symposium allowed students to share their scholarship with peers, their families, and the largerJMU community. The following student spotlights give a glimpse into the ongoing work of two exemplary Honors students. Best of luck to them and their peers as they complete their capstone research during the 2021-2022 school year!



Rodrigo (Rod) Morales ('22): I am a rising senior Economics major from Long Island, NY. I have a double minor in Spanish-English Translation and Interpretation and Honors Interdisciplinary Studies (a mouthful, I know)! Coming to the end of my college experience, I had to start thinking about and preparing for my Honors capstone. My thesis is about analyzing the growth and development of El Salvador compared to other countries of similar population size, with similar and different industries in varying regions.

Brenna Gannon ('22): As a Biology major with a microbiology concentration, I chose to pursue a thesis project focusing on aquatic microbiology. For my capstone, I am working in Dr. Steffen's lab researching samples from Lake Tai, China's third largest freshwater lake which is plagued with cyanobacterial harmful algal blooms, or cHABs. These cHABs are expected to increase in severity and frequency as climate change progresses. In 2018, my lab collected bloom samples both during and after a typhoon during a trip to China. My research examines whether the typhoon impacted nitrogen uptake by bacteria in Lake Tai. Ultimately, I hope to be able to provide insight into whether climate change is impacting cHABs and their natural nutrient cycling.



ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT: DR. GRAY KIDD

Gray F. Kidd ('12, '14M), an historian of race and popular culture in modern Brazil, recently received his Ph.D. in history from Duke University. His dissertation, Surrendering to the Street in Mid-Century Recife: The Living Legacies of Slavery in Black and White, is an urban cultural history of slavery's afterlives in the Northeast Brazilian state of Pernambuco. Pernambuco received one-fifth of the enslaved Africans that landed in the Western Hemisphere. It examines Brazil's "public secret" of racism while exploring how Recife's nonwhite majority contested these hierarchies through humor, religiosity, and forms of popular entertainment.



Dr. Kidd spent nearly 32 months in Brazil through the generous support of a Fulbright-Hays Doctoral Dissertation Research Award (DDRA), two Foreign Language and Area Studies (FLAS) fellowships for the study of Portuguese, and countless travel grants from the Duke Center for Latin American and Caribbean Studies, Duke Brazil Initiative, Department of History, and The Graduate School. Gray was also fortunate to present his research internationally, including in Colombia, Mexico, and Italy.

Since arriving at Duke in 2014, Kidd held multiple roles in the public humanities. From 2014 to 2016, he coordinated the Global Brazil Humanities Lab, an interdisciplinary hub for the study of the world's fifth largest country. The GBHL fomented conversations across the humanities, social sciences, and physical sciences through cluster signature projects focused on social movements, the environment, and the arts. It is also in this role that he successfully planned five Global Brazil Conferences, which brought scholars to Duke for a series of public-facing events.

In 2016 and 2017, he co-led a binational team of faculty, undergraduate, and graduate student collaborators from Duke and the Multidisciplinary Institute of the Federal Rural University of Rio de Janeiro that examined the impacts of Brazil's vast expansion of free public higher education since 2000. The team's work centered on the Baixada Fluminense, a racially and socially stigmatized region of greater Rio de Janeiro. Close study revealed that policymakers do not sufficiently understand the various obstacles that racially and socioeconomically marginalized populations face when they pursue mobility through higher education. Most recently, Kidd advised a group of undergraduate student curators who produced the virtual exhibit "Black Lives Matter Brazil-USA: The Global Fight for Breath."

In August, Kidd will join the history faculty at The Agnes Irwin School in greater Philadelphia.
