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Introduction

Background

The Office on Children and Youth (OCY) at James Madison University's Institute for Innovation in Health and Human Services (IIHHS) is pleased to present the Youth Data Survey 2011 for Harrisonburg and Rockingham County. The OCY has been working with the community since 1996 to provide key data about local youth risk behaviors and produce data which enables the community to develop priority areas around youth issues. Administered by the OCY, the Youth Data Survey (YDS) is a collaborative effort between many community partners including: United Way, Harrisonburg City and Rockingham County Public Schools, Eastern Mennonite High School, James Madison University, Healthy Community Council, Rockingham Memorial Hospital Community Health, and the Strong Families-Great Youth Coalition. Over 50 agency representatives and community volunteers assist with the administration of the survey every two years. The goal of the YDS is to examine the current as well as longitudinal trends around local youth risk behaviors with an approach that taps into the larger community question of what assets we need in our community to help people successfully navigate from infancy to adulthood. The objectives of the YDS for the community are the following: produce reliable information on risk behaviors; assess needs; ascertain gaps in service; assist in determining priority areas; allow agencies access to local data in order to write successful state, federal, and foundation grant applications to address the identified needs; and evaluate progress over time on the impact agency programs have on the local youth. The ultimate goal is to improve the quality of life for the children and youth in Harrisonburg and Rockingham County.

Every two years in October the survey is administered to approximately half of all 8th, 10th, and 12th graders in Harrisonburg City and Rockingham County. The students complete two surveys: one is the nationally recognized Pride Survey; and the other is the locally created Youth Data Survey based in part on the national Youth Risk Behavior Survey. Every 10 years a committee comprised of local agency representatives and interested community members evaluate the survey and make any necessary additions and revisions. JMU students assist OCY staff and help secure and train agency representatives and community volunteers to administer the survey. This report would not be possible without the support of our local schools, community organizations and many dedicated volunteers.

The survey was administered during the last week of October 2011 to youth in Harrisonburg City and Rockingham County. Surveys were completed by 2,170 students (1062 females and 1099 males) between the ages of 13 and 19.


Navigation









The majority of youth are not employed (74.1%), an increase from 2009. 25.9% of youth are employed (full or part time), a decrease from 27.2% in 2009.



Harrisonburg's dropout rate rose sharply for the 2009-2010 school year, while Rockingham County's dropout rate slightly decreased.



Since 2009 Rockingham County has seen a decline in the number of students enrolled in public schools. Harrisonburg has seen a steady incline in enrollment since 2008.











What the numbers and other information told us:

The number of youth remaining abstinent has decreased slightly from 68.2% in 2009 to 67.6% in 2011.



What the numbers and other information told us:

Sexual activity has decreased in 8th, 10th, and 12th graders. The most significant decrease is seen in 10th graders (4.2%).

68.4% of teens say that they are sexually abstinent. 74.1% of youth agree that abstinence is the only 100% effective way to prevent pregnancy and the spread of sexually transmitted infection(s). This number has decreased from 2009 (77%).



What the numbers and other information told us:

In 2010, the rate of teen pregnancy among females age 15-17 in Harrisonburg (54.4 per 1,000) triples the teen pregnancy rate among females age 15-17 in Virginia (18.8 per 1,000).

While the rate of teen pregnancy has been rising in Harrisonburg, it has been dropping in Virginia since 2006.



11.9% of teens who are sexually active say that they do not use any form of protection.


There was a 4.7% increase in the use of condoms and a 1.4% increase in the use of birth control shots from 2009. All other methods showed a decrease in use.



Harrisonburg and Rockingham County experienced an increase in teen pregnancies for the 18-19 year old age group in 2010 after a large decrease in 2009.



What the numbers and other information told us:

In 2009, the percentage of births to mothers with less than 12th grade education in Harrisonburg (30%) is more than double the percentage for the state of Virginia. The percentage of births to mothers with less than 12th grade education in Rockingham County is 6% higher than the percentage for the state of Virginia.

All births to mothers with less than 12th grade education for Virginia, Harrisonburg and Rockingham have slightly decreased since 2008.











There has been a slight decrease in the overall use of tobacco in all grades from 2009.




Cigarettes are the most popular form of tobacco used weekly followed by smokeless tobacco products.















Illicit drug use has increased slightly in Harrisonburg City/Rockingham County as well as nationally.


The Harrisonburg/ Rockingham use of illicit drugs is about the same as the national average for daily, weekly, monthly, and annual use of illicit drugs.

There was a slight decrease in students reporting violence at school without a weapon.









The percentage of teens who always wear a seatbelt increased, while those that don't drink and drive slightly decreased.













82.2% of teens say that they have not intentionally hurt their bodies in the last six months. The number of students who have never thought about committing suicide decreased by 1.5% from 2009.








